Play *Mama Won't Fly* Spurs PFLAG Community Debate By PFLAG-Olympia Board

Late last year, PFLAG-Olympia's Board decided to take advantage of a local fundraising opportunity. Olympia Little Theater proposed donating the proceeds from one night's performance of an upcoming play to our organization as a show of support. There would be some work required on our part — mainly, marketing the tickets to our members and friends — but the generous proposal seemed to be a big win-win for both non-profit organizations. Actually, more like a lopsided win for PFLAG-Olympia, since we would receive ALL revenue from the ticket sales.

It was a no brainer, but we want to take a moment to explain what happened next as there were some unintended consequences, hurt feelings, and transgender education for our members. The goofball, comedic plot seemed simple and unoffensive at first glance. *Mama Won't Fly!* is billed as a Southern-flavored, road-trip comedy by Mama (Norleen) and her single workaholic daughter (Savannah) who endlessly get on each other's "last nerve." They are traveling west to California for Savannah's brother Walker's wedding, and Mama announces at the last minute that a recent bout of airsickness has her determined to drive, not fly. Another last-minute development is the sudden appearance of Walker's fiancé, Hayley, who has decided that tagging along on the trip would be a great way to bond with her new family. The three ladies careen from one stop to the next, running into bizarre characters such as "Cousin Chicken" and absurd roadside attractions like the "American Museum of Foundation Garments." It's goofy fun.

The twist that caused the strife came at the end of the play and surrounding the gender identity of Spud Farley, Savannah's long lost fiancé who left her without explanation. She is obsessed with getting back in touch with him and takes their road trip on a detour to find him after tracking him down along the way. Mama does not like this idea and begs her to leave well enough alone. We find out towards the end of the play that Spud is a cross dresser, maybe a drag queen (this scene takes place in Vegas), maybe LGBTQ, it's unclear. What made many in our audience that night uncomfortable was the relief and gratefulness of Savannah to her mother for convincing Spud to run away and leave so as not to basically ruin her life.

This precipitated some emotional e-mail discussion in our PFLAG-Olympia community over the following days and weeks. We invited OLT to a meeting to hear some members' concerns. We would like to stress that the folks at OLT were nothing but gracious and generous to PFLAG-Olympia in this brief convergence of two well-meaning non-profit organizations. Our treasury was boosted substantially, thanks to our members and friends who purchased tickets. But, perhaps most importantly, the queasy feelings generated by the off-putting Spud Farley character were converted into a very positive discussion about "cisgender privilege" that occupied the following two
