Spotlight on David Kindle

If the following statement is less than one hundred percent accurate, it's pretty damn close: No member of PFLAG Olympia has been active as long or as consistently as David Kindle.

David was on the founding board when the chapter began "umpteen years ago" with about a dozen members meeting upstairs in the old Parish Hall of St. Johns Episcopal Church. "We started small," David said. "There

was controversy in the church about us meeting there. It was the only group that ever had to get permission from their board."

He remembers one woman from the church who came to the meetings with her own personal agenda based on a literal interpretation of the Bible, and they had to pass rules disallowing anyone from bringing their own agenda to the group.

Acceptance of glbt folk by the religious community is important to David. who about a year ago became a Lay Eucharistic Minister of the Episcopal Church, and who is a South Sound representative for Integrity Puget Sound, the only glbt group that is officially recognized by the church. His message is that true Christianity is accepting of all. "A lot of people don't understand that what passes

Mixed bag at PFLAG By Teresa Guajardo

My partner, who lived in Chicago for many years, never dreamed of attending Parents, Families & Friends of Lesbians and Gays. She is a lesbian and lesbians have their own groups, or so she thought. I didn't know PFLAG existed until I came out to my family and was subsequently rejected by them. I needed others to accept me and tell me Thanks to the loving care, acceptance, I was okay even if I identified as a lesbian. Someone recommended PFLAG and I went.

I found a mixed group of individuals: some of them were parents and family members (of other lesbians and gays); others were straight individuals who felt strongly about equal rights for all—and they didn't even have a gay relative. I also found lesbians, gays, bisexuals, transgender, and questioning individuals. And some of them were also parents, family members, and friends of lesbians and gays. What a group!

I met parental figures and other straight

people to whom sexual orientation was irrelevant when it came to personal acceptance. They decided to like me based on merit, not affectation. I met queer individuals who were leading productive, healthy lives. They were out and proud models for me to emulate. Eventually I was appointed to fill a vacancy on the Board of Directors and then was elected to two consecutive two year terms.

and modeling of PFLAG members, I have grown into a more complete person. I even met my life partner at PFLAG. As my final term ends on the PFLAG Board of Directors (there are term limits) I find myself reflecting on the scared, uncertain individual who came to her first meeting in December of 1996. Thank you, PFLAG. May you always be a safe, supportive, and accepting, advocate and educator of LGBTQ individuals and issues.

Financial woes at PFLAG national office seeks help from chapters

The national office of PFLAG, which continues to offer invaluable support to local chapters such as ours, is suffering some severe financial problems and needs help from local chapters. Over they years they have helped us in countless ways, now it is time for us to help them. Following is a letter from Executive Director Kristen Kingdon (who, by-the-way, has announced her retirement effective May 15, 2002.)

Dear PFLAG Affiliates, Members and Friends,

I come to you with a heavy heart for what is happening in our world and how PFLAG's national office is being affected by it. PFLAG did not meet its income projections this past fiscal year, and despite keeping our expenses under budget, we ended the year at a loss. Since then, our income has dropped significantly due to several factors:

- the economic downturn and uncertainty about the future
 - - diversion of giving towards disaster relief
- - the disruption of the DC postal service due to anthrax contamination.

All of PFLAG's mail, including contributions, comes through the Brentwood post office, where two postal workers died due to anthrax inhalation. We have not had a normal mail delivery for several weeks, and don't know when we'll receive all our mail.

As a result of this revenue downturn, we have

eliminated five staff positions at the national office - east field manager, the executive assistant, the communications director, the finance manager and the major gifts manager.

At the same time, we are committed to continue service to PFLAG's chapter network - the heart of our work. We are reevaluating our essential duties and looking at how we can continue service in a drastically altered environment.

We will be relying more on email and looking at new methods of providing service – particularly using the website (www.plag.org), internet chatrooms and listservs; the affiliate mailing will be much leaner.

At this time, we need your support to sustain our national office. Please let us know how we can continue to serve you at this difficult time for our organization (and world). We appreciate any support that you are able to provide the national office. Your dedication and tireless efforts in your local community sustain us and give us hope in this time of uncertainty, if you have any questions (or just want to provide support), please feel free to call or email me at 202/467-8180, or kkingdon@pflag.org.

for Christianity in the U.S. is not historic Christianity," he said. "Some scholars call it American Christianity, and it has caused a lot of problems."

David and his partner, Spencer Daniels, have been together for two decades. They were the second couple to register as domestic partners with the City of Olympia, and they are also registered with the state as domestic partners. On Memorial Day 2002 they will celebrate their twentieth anniversary. Ironically, even though gay marriage is not legal, they are recognized by the state health care authority as a married couple. This came about when Spencer named David as his partner on his insurance claim. Now, according to the health care authority they have been married since May 25, 1982.

In addition to his involvement with PFLAG, David has been a longtime activist with many other area organizations. He was co-chair of GLOW (Gays and Lesbians of Olympia, Washington), one of the first gay organizations here. And he was on the founding boards of the Rainbow Center and Black Hills Pride, and he was involved with Spectrum, the organization that put on shows at Thekla back when it was almost exclusively a gay club.

When asked what he considers the greatest advance in glbt civil rights over his many years of activism, David said it would be advances in the issue of marriage and domestic partnership. "It wasn't even spoken of years ago," he said.

When asked what PFLAG means to him, he said, "Mostly it's what I can do for other people – lend support to those who are coming out and those who would love to but can't because of family, religion or their job situation."
