I recognized that my deep emotional connections were with girls and then women. Boys, and then men, were just people I dated. Because it was the thing to do. Then an evening out with a gal friend turned into a date, and she turned into my girlfriend and the rest, as they say, is history.

Imagine my surprise when I started sharing the joy of my newly identified self and not receiving words of encouragement. I heard things like "It's just a phase you're going through." "You'll be fine once you get married." A host of similar comments and fewer "friends" returning my calls made me realize that the joy and discovery of a new aspect of my being created fear and loathing in others.

I now had a 'secret'. Which totally went against my nature of being open honest, up front with my thoughts and feelings.

I went through this process in my late 20s. Imagine the struggle of those in their teens.

Being queer, gay, lesbian, dyke is only a small portion of that which makes me the person I am. Do I strike fear and loathing in your hearts because I am a Democrat? That I have Christian beliefs? That I support animal rights and like to read mysteries?

A Rochester, N.Y., children's museum has a wonderful activity. Paper shapes are cut out to represent heads, bodies, arms, legs. Each shape has a description on it. Gay, straight, Jewish, Christian, happy, sad, schoolteacher, farmer, reader, writer, musician, poet and so on. You select pieces of your identity, put them together and lo and behold, everyone comes together in the shape of a human being.

It is a simple activity but, sadly, not a simple concept. Every step we take, every experience we feel, every day we walk on the planet shapes the person we become. Yet, with all those experiences, every person is still a human being. Do not focus on only a portion of a person's identity. For you will miss the richness that makes them a whole human being.

Yes, I drifted into my lesbian identity, but it took me 50 years on this planet to become the person I am today. And if lesbian is all you see, whoa, are you missing out!
