When I came into this world, my parents loved me unconditionally. They still do, for the most part; although, they really don't know much about me. My mother told me, when I came out to her, that I was not to tell my father. That was almost five years ago. I haven't said a word since. Every year, I visit my parents for the winter holidays, and every year since I came out to my mother, I have had to hide my intimate relationships when visiting.

What is it that tells us to hide, rather

than risk pain, shame, embarrassment, or isolation? Why is it easier to believe that we will not be met with love and kindness? I believe in love, don't get me wrong. My family-of-choice consists of four cats, a dog and a partner. We do not have children, we do not live in the same home, but we love each other. What is it about love that some people do not understand, or refuse to believe in? Or fear?

I am lucky that I have friends who care about me, who cherish my life, and who challenge me to be proud of who I am. Someday I hope to cross that bridge with my family. I know that I will not be whole until I do. I guess it's the fear of the unknown or the fear that they will hate or disown me that prevents me from showing them who I truly am.

This holiday season, while we are celebrating, with family, relatives, nobody, whomever, I hope that we will cherish what we have, wherever we have love. It is something that each of us wants and needs and often do not have. So while my outlook on the holiday season may be a little cynical, I still value the places where I do find support, love, and safety.

In the beginning


