Health care and other concerns for the trans community

I had planned to rant and rave over the lack of medical treatment in Washington for the Trans Community. I also realized that there are so many other problems that I have to give my observations on everything.

The T in GLBT seems to be forsaken by some. While there are allies in many places we seem to be the last ones to be considered. I sometimes wonder if we are just a passing thought until someone needs more exposure. We are easier to pick out in crowds while we are in transition, and are better targets. Due to our inability to look normal at first we are often lied to, insulted, threatened, physically attacked, discriminated against, and just plain left out. There are people trying to change things, and I am grateful that I have been acquainted with many good people, but many times when alone I can hear people talking behind my back or some more rudely making comments to their friends in hopes of embarrassing me in public. Lately I hear of others who fear when they will be attacked again. There seems to be no quick fix to this and now there is a move to do a GLBTQ.... Guardian Angel thing. I see escalating violence in our future.

I have come to my own opinion that the medical profession in Washington is far from trans friendly. Why is it so hard to get a doctor to do simple procedures? Why do office personnel treat us like a contagious disease, seem so rude when we try to find a physician to do simple procedures. Doctors are making money to do all sorts of things to "normal" people, what makes us a risk? When we do find one to talk to us they charge an arm and a leg to get a consultation just to turn us down later. That is not ethical if you ask me, and seems to go against the oath they take. I have only found three doctors I trust in this state and none of them can do the work I need. This why everyone takes all their money to other states and countries to get above average medical procedures. I do hope this gets to a LOT of doctors.

I do hope it gets better here. There are so many talented people willing to share what they know and do, but, until the majority of the population pulls their heads out of their four point contacts and drag their minds kicking and screaming into this century it will be a slow uphill climb. I am grateful for groups like PFLAG and GVHP to give us a place to be seen and heard with dignity and safety. I shall keep moving forward and hoping the light at the end of the tunnel is not a train coming my way.

APA Asks the Pentagon to Update Instruction Listing Homosexuality as a Mental Disorder

Arlington, Va. - On June 13, the American Psychiatric Association (APA) sent a letter to the Pentagon requesting that a Department of Defense (DoD) instruction that lists homosexuality as a mental disorder be updated. APA CEO and Medical Director James H. Scully Jr., M.D., wrote:

"Based on scientific and medical evidence the APA declassified homosexuality as a mental disorder in 1973 - a position shared by all other major health and mental health organizations based on their own review of the science. I urge you to remove homosexuality from the 'Physical Disability Evaluation' instruction."

Dr. Scully's letter was addressed to Assistant Secretary of Defense for Health Affairs William Winkenwerder Jr., M.D. The full text of the letter is below:

> I am writing on behalf of the American Psychiatric Association's more than 36,000 psychiatric physician members and as a veteran of the United States Navy. The American Psychiatric Association (APA) is a national medical specialty society whose members specialize in the diagnosis, treatment, prevention, and research of mental illnesses including substance use disorders. addition, the APA publishes the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders, the latest version of which is known as the DSM-IV-TR, which is the standard reference book on mental disorders and their diagnosis.

I write to respectfully request that you update Department of Defense Instruction Number 1332.38, which addresses "Physical Disability Evaluation," is dated November 14, 1996, and to my knowledge is still in effect. Enclosure 5 of the instruction, in section E5.1.2.9, refers to "Certain Mental Disorders including: ...Homosexuality." DSM-IV-TR does not include homosexuality as a mental disorder. Based on scientific and medical evidence the APA declassified homosexuality as a mental disorder in 1973 - a position shared by all other major health and mental health organizations based on their own review of the science. I urge you to remove homosexuality from the "Physical Disability Evaluation" instruction.

The Stay Close Campaign

- ▼ It is estimated that one in four families includes someone that is gay, lesbian, bisexual, or transgendered.
- ▼ 69% of GLBT youth report experiencing some form of harassment or violence, with 46% reporting verbal harassment, 36% reporting sexual harassment, 12% reporting physical harassment, and 6% reporting physical assault.
- ▼ Gay and lesbian youths are two to three times more likely to commit suicide than other youths.
- ▼ Of 1.3 million homeless children on America's streets, 500,000 are thought to be GLBT kids thrown out by their parents.

A few years ago PFLAG NY decided that these facts could no longer be ignored. So they took the lead in developing an awareness campaign to get the word out about PFLAG by launching the "Stay Close" campaign. This public relations campaign features straight celebrities with their gay relatives. The message is simple: Stay Close to your loved ones because relationships are too precious to lose.
