I say life is too short to wait for other people to decide that it's okay for me to pledge my love to my partner in front of family and friends. And yes, I do realize that anything we do isn't legally binding, but you know what? I don't care! I don't think I'll feel any more committed to my partner if we get to sign a contract that says we're legally bound together.

So, in June, my partner and I will be getting married and I'm always going to call it a wedding. I'm not going to call it a commitment ceremony. To me that sounds like something that you would do if you were committing yourself to a hospital or something and not throwing a party to celebrate love. ## Where Do My Dues Go?

One of the benefits of taking over as treasurer is finally understanding where my dues go. I thought others might like to know that also, so here's an explanation...

We ask the following for dues:

Individual: \$35 Household: \$50

Student/Senior/Low Income: \$15

For every paying member household, we're obligated to send the PFLAG-National \$15 annually (in October), to support PFLAG's national's efforts. Anything above that, we use for our work. For instance, if we receive \$50 from a member, we will send \$15 to PFLAG-national, and apply \$35 to our chapter's operation.

Some of our main expenses are: newsletter supplies and mailing; rent, and telephone. In general, we're able to cover the cost of brochures by selling items at Super Saturday and Pride.

All membership and donations are tax-deductible. For 2007, we have 33 paying members (though some more may come in before the end of the year).

I hope this helps folks understand PFLAG Olympia's finances, and your dues. Please feel free to contact me if you have any questions.
