In July we showed the film "It's Elementary" followed by a great discussion. In November we will show the follow-up film, "It's Still Elementary."

Both films provide insights into how teachers can teach about glbtq issues in age-appropriate ways in elementary school.

STILL It's Elementary TALKING ABOUT GAY ISSUES IN SCHOOL

By revisiting some of the students in the first film 10 years later, the second film also shows how such lessons affected the young students, who are now in college or in the workforce.



Here is GLAAD's OUTFEST Mini Review by Sarah Holbert:

When It's Elementary was released in 1996, it was truly groundbreaking. Very few school administrators thought it was possible to discuss gay or lesbian issues with young children. But when cameras followed teachers actually giving the lesson in their classrooms, many viewers had an "a-ha!" moment: Of course kids can understand these issues! Viewers watched as children critically discussed their own internalized homophobia, telling their teachers what they had learned (and mis-learned) from media and examining why some people think the way they do about gays and lesbians.

The film was really well-received, screening at festivals across the nation and then around the world. Many school districts were clamoring for it. Chicago Public Schools actually mandated that every single elementary school in the district work the film into its curriculum.

However, when *It's Elementary* secured a television deal with PBS, suddenly, the right wing attacked. Hateful propaganda was generated from anti-gay extremist groups, several of whom used the film to unify its base. PBS stations stood firm in the face of opposition and aired the film.

Perhaps the most poignant moments in *It's STILL Elementary*, though, is the follow-up with teachers and students featured in the first film, ten years later, to see how lessons about LGBT people changed their lives. It is incredible how many straight people confessed that participating in the film forever changed their opinions about gays and lesbians, and how they still use the lessons learned to educate others about their treatment of the LGBT community.

Both films were directed by Debra Chasnoff of Groundspark, and "It's Still Elementary" was co-directed by Johnny Symons, who wrote and directed the 2002 documentary "Daddy and Papa" — another fine film we have watched at PFLAG-Olympia.

In order to make sure we have time for discussion after the film we will condense the introductions, announcements and the break-out support parts of the meeting and start the film at about 3 p.m.

A word from the chapter president

When our predecessors in PFLAG-Olympia drew up the by-laws governing the operation of the chapter, they wisely chose to place term limits on board members. Without term limits, the same small group of people could run the chapter year after year after year, and it might be too easy for board members to abuse their power.

Furthermore, if just a handful of people do all the work and then one or more of those people is suddenly no longer able, the chapter could be left floundering. We would then end up with no one to plan programs, invite guest speakers, bring snacks to meetings, pay the bills, table at events and so forth.

Conversely, we might end up with the same handful of people having to do all the work. Without new board members the chapter would stagnate. These are situations we definitely want to avoid.

Recently we have had to amend our by-laws to allow for an exception to term limits if the membership of the board falls below a workable level. We have had to do this because our board membership has indeed fallen to dangerously low levels.

I should no longer be on the board at all. I had served my term as president in the past, but I agreed to serve again when there was no one else able to do it. Likewise, our Treasurer, Jeff, has served beyond his limit, as have other board members.

The problem is, I honestly don't know what would happen if any of us who are officers resigned or, for whatever reason, were unable to continue in our positions.
