Steve Schalchlin—back from the brink and alive in Olympia!

Our program May 10th will feature Steve Schalchlin. That evening Steve will perform at Capital Playhouse as a fundraiser concert for PFLAG-Olympia.



Steve is a singer/songwriter and composer of two hit Off-Broadway musicals. He wrote the cult Off-Broadway rock gospel musical, “The Last Session,” which garnered Best Musical nominations from the New York Drama League and New York Outer Critics Circle. He is the recipient of the GLAAD Media Award and two PFLAG-LA Oscar Wilde Awards.

Over a decade ago when he was dying of AIDS, Steve wrote songs about his experience with the disease. Many of the songs were outrageously funny. His life partner, Jim Brochu, wrote a play based on Steve’s songs, and thus their first musical, “The Last Session” was born. In story and song it tells the tale of Gideon, a former gospel singer who crossed over to become a Pop

star. Gideon is dying of AIDS, and he clashes in a recording studio with a fundamentalist Christian singer who adores him but doesn’t know he is gay. Jim described it as “the funniest play about suicide you’ll ever see.”

Just about the time the play opened Steve started on new drugs that brought him back from the brink of death. Today he still has to live with horrible side effects (which he sings about in a hilarious song that parodies military music and equates death by “Friendly Fire” with the side effects of AIDS medications). Now he and his partner have also written and performed a successful autobiographical play titled “The Big Voice,” based on their experiences growing up as the son of a Missionary Baptist preacher (Steve) and a Catholic with aspirations to become either The Pope — or a musical diva a la Ethel Merman (Jim).

May 10 at 7 p.m. Steve will perform a special Mothers Day benefit concert for PFLAG at Capital Playhouse in Olympia, with special guest appearance by Jeff Kingsbury, who is gracefully donating his theater for the event.

Tickets are \$20. The box office is open Tuesday through Friday 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. Call (360) 943-2744. There are only 125 seats and we expect tickets to sell out quickly, so get yours right away.

Steve will also be our guest and program at the May PFLAG meeting and will play the piano, sing and tell stories in a preview for the concert that evening.

Suicide Prevention with GLBTQ Youth: The Facts

Why Do We Need Training on Suicide Prevention with GLBTQ Youth?

An increased number of risk factors and typically fewer protective factors place our gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgendered, and questioning youth at higher risk for suicide and self-harm.

This workshop will address the particular issues that put these youth face that increase their risk. The importance of protective factors will also be discussed. There is a strong focus on what we can do to increase support for GLBTQ youth, I look at for areas for this: families, individuals, service providers, and schools.

Schools can be an unsafe environment for GLBTQ youth. In a national study conducted in 2007 by GLSEN (Gay, Lesbian, and Straight Education Network) on school climate they found the following: 86.2% of GLBT students reported being verbally harassed, 44.1% reported being physically harassed, and 60.8% of GLBT students reported that they felt unsafe in school because of their sexual orientation.

Research is clear: an increase in support for GLBTQ youth reduces their risk of suicide.

It is our hope that those who work with, care for, and/or live amongst GLBTQ identified youth will be better able to provide the needed support to these youth using the tools provided in this workshop.

What to expect from a workshop on suicide prevention with GLBTQ youth?

- ▼ Increased knowledge about the risk and protective factors of particular concern for GLBTQ youth
- ▼ Education about how to increase support for these youth
- ▼ Heightened awareness of the warning signs for clinical depression & suicide
- ▼ Enhanced ability to differentiate suicidal attempts and self-harm
- ▼ Know the steps for intervening
- ▼ Increased recognition of resources for GLBTQ youth

BOOK REVIEW

Dignity, Dogmatism and Same Sex Relationships by Gilbert Rossing

Gilbert Rossing, known to local PFLAG members as Gib, has recently published a fascinating book titled Dignity, Dogmatism and Sam Sex Relationships (subtitled What Science and Scripture Teach us). This long title clearly maps out what the book is about.

Gib is a retired Lutheran minister who with his wife, Beth, has two gay sons and two straight daughters. When their sons came out, the Rossings had the experience shared by many PFLAG parents of learning about GLBTQ issues. As a scholar and theologian, Gib found himself struggling to understand apparent contradictions between what the Bible said about homosexuality — and more specifically the common ways many people interpreted scripture — and what his heart and scientific studies told him. In his book, he carefully examines these issues from both theological and scientific viewpoints and illustrates his commentary with personal narrative.

The facts are interesting, well researched and clearly presented, but they make for somewhat dry and academic reading. The dryness, however, is alleviated by the personal narrative.

We have two copies of this book in the PFLAG library (although as of this writing they are both checked out). They are also available at Orca Books and online at amazon.com (or Google Dignity-Dogmatism).

Chad Clarkson's Story at Olympia High School, Class of 1987

Going to Olympia High School in the eighties, and being a black and gay person definitely presented a few challenges. I was fortunate however, due to the fact that I was well liked and eventually became the Sophomore Class President. I like to think that I did an excellent job hiding it. Maybe some of my friends back then may disagree, but they never let me know it.

Because I knew many of these people as far back as kindergarten, I did my best to be sure they wouldn't catch on.

I had a girlfriend my sophomore year, and dated many girls. Eventually this was all going to end.

In the summer of 1985, my mother and I moved. In my mind this was the opportunity to "come out". I changed schools and that opened the door to my new life. I didn't have to cope with the challenges of being a black student in Olympia, now I had to face the challenges of being gay. Coming out to friends was the easy part. Coming out to my family was more difficult for me to say than it was for them to accept. For that, I was extremely fortunate and remain grateful.

My personal challenges back then at Olympia High School, regarding my sexual orientation, have always kept me on guard. The fear that I would lose my friends, as well as considering my status in my class, it would be nearly scandalous.

Now that I have lived through all of that, there's neither fear nor any secrecy from those who I love. Now I'm honored to be able to share this story with you, and hope you all understand that it's a much more tolerable society today that it was 25years ago. There's still progress that must be made, but now it's your turn make it happen.
