Welcome to the PFLAG extended family!

Olympia PFLAG began in January of 1993 when a group of concerned parents, friends, and citizens got together and decided that there was a role that PFLAG could play in our community. Beginning in February, we held monthly meetings, and our membership has continually grown.

With this first newsletter, we begin an outreach to fulfill our mission. Straight from our national mission statement, here's what we are about: "Parents, Friends and Families of Lesbians and Gays promotes the health and well-being of gay, lesbian and bisexual persons, their families and friends..." All of us fall somewhere within this group, and we simply seek health and wellbeing for all of us.

How? Our first means is "through SUPPORT, to cope with an adverse society." Our Support Helpline, 866-0511, is always available for anyone who needs understanding, information, or to talk with a friend. Our Support Group is an open, confidential session, which meets the second Sunday of each month at 2:00 p.m. at the First United Methodist Church, Olympia.

Our second means is "EDUCATION, to enlighten an illinformed public." We offer literature, a free lending library of books, tapes and videos, speakers,

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tapes, and videos, speakers, classes for groups, and hoformed leaders ready to share thek understanding with individuals.

Our third means is "ADVO CACY, to end discrimination and to secure equal civil rights." We provide expert testimony for legislative hearings, team up with other gay and gay -friendly groups, and provide articles and letters to editors.

In summary, our group "provides opportunity for dialogue about sexual orientation and acts to create a society that is healthy, and respectful. of human diversity."

We hope you will join us and participate as soon and as often as you find it helpful.

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My Journey Out of the Closet

Discovering that my adult child is homosexual has led me through a series of actions and reactions like nothing else in my life. Perhaps my journey can help others in facing their own journey. I am still closeted a bit, since my child is not fully "out" at work, and I honor that choice.

When my child first admitted to being homosexual, my reaction was surprise and shock. I needed someone to talk with, but who could I trust with such a revelation? Next, came profound feelings of shame and sometimes blame. This was coupled with the frantic feeling that my child needed to get "fixed" or cured.

Negative questions followed: Whose fault is it? Mine? How did we fail as parents? Will my child corrupt others? Are all my parental dreams lost forever? I experienced a brief period of grief at what I feared was the loss of my child. At that time, I confided in my pastor. Fortunately, he sent me to a local PFLAG group.

I went to my first meeting in fear and trembling. But my embarrassment soon gave way to tears, then relief, at finding a group of truly understanding people. My experience was theirs, too, and we could learn and grow together. I soon came to realize that I wanted to relate to my homosexual child in our traditional open ways and get used to the fact that s/he is the same good person I have always known. Only one small factor is different than I had known.

Next, I had to face my own ignorance regarding homosexuality. I began reading all of the sound literature I could find and avoiding the homophobic trash. This led me to reinterpret the homophobia within myself and throw out the distorted public rhetoric surrounding homosexuality.

Beyond that, other questions remained: Am I clear about my own sexuality? How do I relate to his/her partner? Shall we invite them both for

Thanksgiving dinner? How do we tell Grandmother, our close family friends, and our neighbors?

Finally, with these issues behind me, I began to meet more and more lesbian and gay people. I found them as normal as my own straight friends. In fact, I found many to be among the most loving, creative and socially responsible people I have ever known. I have come to want to relate to the local gay community, and now I find myself sharing in the larger gay rights movement.

At each stage of my coming out, my fellow PFLAG members have been supportive. I could speak openly and be guaranteed total confidentiality. Their excellent programs have guided my think-

PFLAG may not have all the answers. but we (I'm part of it now) stand ready to offer both support and education for each new participant as others seek their own answers.

Board Elections Coming Soon

Elections for the PFLAG Board of Directors will be held at the annual PFLAG membership meeting on November 14, prior to the regular support group meeting at 2 p.m. at the First United Methodist Church. Each PFLAG member will have the opportunity to vote for seven board positions at this meeting.

Anyone wishing to vote in the election, but who is not currently a member of PFLAG, may join prior to or at the meeting.

The Board of Directors is responsible for directing the business of the organization and each director will serve a two year term. Currently, PFLAG has a provisional board made up of volunteers who originally worked on starting the organization in early 1993. Most of the members of the provisional board have expressed a willingness to run for a formal board position.

The following individuals are running for board positions:

Position #1 - Betty Beeman. Betty currently serves as Co-president and is very active in support issues.

Position #2 - Paul Beeman. Paul is the other Co-President and has been active in support and advocacy issues.

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New Orleans Hosts 12th Annual P-FLAG FEDERATION Convention

The 12th Annual Convention of the Federation of Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays met in New Orleans, LA over the Labor Day weekend. Paul and I represented the Olympia chapter, joining some 550 other parents and family members from the United States, Canada and Puerto Rico.

From more than 40 workshops we chose only 4 each, mixing themes on improving local chapters with those that dealt with the broader issues of support and understanding in homes and schools. Neither of us could resist hearing Deb Price, the lesbian columnist carried by The Olympian and 80 other newspapers across the


In addition to the workshops, we were inspired by outstanding keynote speakers: Larry Bagneris, Jr., the first openly gay delegate from Texas to the Democratic National Convention in 1980; and Representative Gerry E. Studds (D-MA), the first openly gay Member of Congress and a strong advocate for gay and lesbian issues, choice and women's health programs. He

publicly affirmed his homosexuality on the floor of the House of Representatives in 1983 and has since been re-elected five times.

Two business meetings during the weekend allowed delegates to make important decisions regarding the Federation by-laws. The name of the organization was changed to "Parents, Families and Friends of Lesbians and Gays," reflecting our wider commitment to all family members. The acronym P-FLAG will remain the same. Other changes refined and restructured the national organization to ensure a more efficient operation. We can provide copies of the revised bylaws.

Two very full days were lightened by an outstanding performance by Lynn Lavner, a lesbian comic/musician, Dixieland jazz during lunch breaks, a contemporary worship service on Sunday morning. and a party to end all parties. Mardi Gras style, complete with real Mardi Gras costumes.

Pervading all was the incredible sense of "family" we experienced with the other participants. We're already looking forward to meeting in San Francisco, Labor Day weekend, 1994 and hope some of you can be there as well.
